

## **Sports Premium 2022-2023**

Some key achievements to date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
High quality sports coaching is in place with teachers working alongside them, to enhance their knowledge and as CPD. Teachers are becoming more confident in the delivery of PE. Pupils are physically active during school and during extra-curricular activities, which are school based and in their own time.  We have taken what positives we can from the COVID pandemic with regards to having to do things differently. We have therefore adjusted the way we organise our swimming provision, to last over a period of 3 years rather than one.
