

## What is Pupil Premium?

Pupil Premium is a grant allocated to schools by reference of the number of children who are currently known to be eligible for Free Schools Meals (FSM) and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. The calculation of the payment also takes account of pupils who have been eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years (known as the Ever 6 FSM measure).

### Aims

- \* 100% of Pupil Premium children will meet their school based end of year targets.
- \* The gaps in attainment for Pupil Premium children and non-Pupil Premium children will continue to close across the curriculum and in every year group across the school.
- \* All Pupil Premium children will have full access to the extended school provision irrespective of means.
- \* All Pupil Premium children will have access to all educational and residential visits irrespective of means.
- \* All families will continue to have access to the services of the Family Link worker.

Our Pupil Premium children have progressed very well throughout the year. There has been some notable academic progress as can be seen from the table above, some children having made well over 4 steps progress which is quite outstanding.

There has also been a lot of progress not readily measured through testing and assessment. Many of the children have grown in confidence; are finding social skills groups of great use; are getting to grips with basic everyday tasks such as shoe lace tying, handwriting, communication etc. All these skills are so important and are fundamental to our children developing and learning.
